Tell us about yourself.

• I am the oldest of 5 kids, who are spread out over seventeen years. My husband and I have four young adult kids, and a grandson. I am lucky to spend a lot of time around kids and families. I also understand the hardships of being a parent. There is a lot of anxiety as parents feel they are supposed to rely on instincts to parent, but society and technology keep changing the family landscape. We felt we were constantly pioneering new rules and solutions, and could not just rely on instincts. As I was studying to earn my masters in elementary education, I realized the value of planning ahead for teachers and decided to try it out for parenting and it was the most valuable resource we had for raising out kids. A plan.

Give a brief description of your book.

• They say there is no instruction manual for parenting, but I would like to think that this book is a step in that direction. The book is a guide for parents to use as they look to create their own systems and goals for their family.

What inspired you to write this book?

• As the oldest of our four kids was approaching her teen years, my husband and I began to worry about what our systems, rules and goals should be. On a family road trip, we began talking and writing down our parenting plans. Occasionally we would mention this parenting notebook to friends and family, and they were curious to see the plan and create one for themselves. There is a need out there for parents and we wanted to share how valuable it is to create a plan that works for your family.

Q & A More Sample Questions

The format of the *NOTEWORTHY PARENTING* book is unique, talk with us about some of the features of your book.


- There are over 90 sketches in the book. They say a picture is worth a thousand words, and the sketches add to the content in order to make the book a fun and yet faster read for busy parents.
- I encourage parents to actively read the book with a pen and a highlighter. This way as they come across helpful information or as they get ideas of their own, they can take notes. There are even blank note taking pages for them to write on.
- Routines, rules and consequences.
- There are Food For Thought Exits. These are like side bars of my experiences as a parent, or resource for parents.

What makes parenting so hard today?

• The ever-changing technology and social climate, keeps parents to scrambling to keep up.

Why should parents create a plan?

- It helps them manage social and technological changes.
- It prepares parents for the stages ahead.
- It helps keep things consistent as needed for siblings.
- It helps parents meet goals that they have for their families such as a special trip, or running a race, or volunteering for a charity.
- It helps parents talk about how they want to parent and get on the same page which keeps the kids see the unity in the decisions and systems within the family.



How do parents use the acronym IDEAS to begin their plan?

MAGINE CONCERNS: Helps parents nail down issues that they are worrying about as well as the goals they want to achieve.

DEVELOP STRATEGIES: This is where parents take the best parenting advice and solutions they have created, and merge them into their unique strategy or plan.

E NLIST OTHERS: Discusses value of a parenting network.

AUTHOR YOUR ROADMAP: Write your plans in the best, easiest way that makes the plan useful to you.

SOLUTIONS: Use your solutions. Tweak and update them as needed.

What is a parenting network?

- These are the people in your family or groups of friends who are parenting along side you. Parents who you can lean on for help. These parents can also gain insights from you, and this elevates everyone's parenting.
- I like to say that parenting is not about keeping up with the Joneses, but rather, teaming up with the Joneses.

Additional Questions

In the book you talk about the three gears of parenting, what are they and how do they tie into creating a parenting plan?

- The three gears are:
 - Family Bonding
 - Coaching Behaviors
 - Letting go
- Parents often times think of parenting as separate activities and roles, but I like to share how all the gears and rolls of parents work together like the cogs in a clock. For example, strong family bonds help kids trust and respect the rules as parents coach their behaviors, which in turn matures kids into independence, represented by the letting go gear.


What are some topics you think parents should be planning for?

- Technology. It changes rapidly and parents need to always be on top of this one.
- Hard talks. Sex, drugs and alcohol, bullying, and that list goes on!
- Teaching kids' money management.
- Chores and adulting.
- Cultural traditions and religious beliefs they may have.
- Routines, rules and consequences.
- Family goals. Things like a once in a lifetime trip. What family bonding or fun goals do you want to do before the kids grow up and move out?



In the book you have Food For Thought Exits, similar to sidebars, what are these and can you share one of your favorites?

- Food For Thought Exits are pit stops in which I share examples of how a strategy relates to the real world or to an experience from my parenting.
- One of my favorites is Borrowing or Stealing? This is a story about my teenage daughter wearing my clothes and leaving me constantly trying to find them.
- Another one is Chores. I admit in this one my inability to create the perfect chores system but list off all my failed attempts. My problem? Lack of consistency.

• I created the companion journal so parents could get begin right away with a book that is already set up by age and other useful categories.

What do your husband and kids think about the book?

• My husband wanted me to write this book years before I started it. He has been my biggest cheerleader throughout this process! The kids have helped critique my sketches and stories throughout the project. They are the subjects of many of the stories and have been extremely supportive.


Final Questions

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
About the Author


Kristin Buchtel
